North Carolina Graduation Requirements

English: 4 courses

Math: 4 courses (Math 1, Math 2, Math 3, and an advanced math)

Science: 3 courses (Earth/ Environmental Science, Biology, and a Physical Science—either physical science or chem-

istry)

Social Studies: 4 courses (World History, American History I, American History II, Civics and Economics)

Health/PE: 1 course

Electives: 2 courses from <u>any combination</u> of Career and Technical Education (CTE), Arts (Band, Chorus, Drama, Art), <u>or</u> Foreign Language. (Note: Foreign language is NOT required to graduate; Two credits in the same foreign language IS required IF you plan to apply to a four-year college.)

Concentration Area: 4 courses—all from one of the following categories—with at least one being a "level 2" or higher:

- A Career and Technical Education (CTE) cluster
- JROTC
- Arts
- Academic (advanced—i.e. <u>beyond minimum requirements</u>— math, science, social studies, or foreign language

Total Credits (1 "credit" for each course) needed: 28

Smart Lunch

Students have a 1-hour block between 2nd and 3rd periods for working with teachers in small groups (or individually) and for lunch. Freshmen are expected to see each teacher at least once each week. Sophomores must see each teacher at least twice each 3-weeks. This is a great opportunity to get help with homework, re-test, complete make-up work, etc. The following schedule outlines which days which teachers are available during Smart Lunch:

Ninth Grade Planning Guide:

- ⇒ <u>Develop good habits!</u> Do your homework every day, attend school every day, and arrive on time every day! Good grades are sure to follow!

- ⇒ Look for opportunities to **volunteer** in your community. You will learn a lot about yourself and others!

Tenth Grade Planning Guide:

- ⇒ All 10th graders will take the **PLAN** test this fall, which is a great practice for the ACT (which you will take in the spring of your 11th grade year). Do your best!
- ⇒ Begin researching colleges and careers that interest you. Make sure that you are taking the classes that fulfill minimum admissions requirements. And keep an open mind: Not all jobs/opportunities require four years of school. Many 6 month or one year programs can significantly improve your earning power!
- ⇒ Listen for information about essay contests and other competitions. Participation (and/or winning) will look great on college/work applications—and could even earn you money or scholarships!
- ⇒ **Keep all awards in a file.** You will be asked to list these on college admissions, scholarship, and job applications your senior year—and you don't want to forget anything!
- ⇒ Think about how you spend your time. If you haven't already done so, join a club or team or an organization that offers skills or activities that match your interests. If you are already involved, take a look at your level of involvement. Are you spread too thin—too many clubs and too little involvement in any of them? Choose the activities that mean the most to you, and look for opportunities to lead small groups, represent the club in regional meetings, etc. If no club exists that matches your interest or hobby, you can always ask a teacher to help you start one!
- ⇒ Talk with your counselor and your teachers about Honors/Advanced classes, Advanced Placement courses, and internships that will be available to you in the next two years. Make sure that you are meeting minimum requirements for those courses now. Challenge yourself academically!
- ⇒ Listen for information about summer enrichment programs or weekend opportunities to learn about careers or colleges.
- ⇒ Think about part time jobs that will help you learn more about yourself and your interests.
